FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Sustaining Education Amidst Crisis: Resilience, Innovation and Hope

As Haiti confronts unprecedented levels of violence and instability, Haitian Educational Initiatives (HEI) stands unwavering in our mission to provide access to education for children in the Jacmel region of Haiti. This year, we not only sustained our programs but also introduced innovative solutions to meet the learning needs of our students in these very difficult times. To ensure the efficacy of our partners' work, we somewhat reduced total enrollment through graduation attrition, restraining our growth during the current volatile conditions.

2024 tested our resilience, creativity, and commitment but also reaffirmed the force multiplier of partnerships. HEI's model is based on collaboration with trusted partners in Haiti who provide the care, programs, and facilities that support our children's education, funded by the generosity of our US donors. **Over 150 students** across primary and secondary levels are directly supported by HEI scholarships in a country with little public education. Our facilities provide safe spaces for the children to gather after school for homework, meals, and care. Our programs introduced vocational training to provide the prospect of employment.

This year, we witnessed the fruits of these efforts:

- We retained 83% of enrolled students, 93% of whom were promoted to the next grade. Six students have graduated from high school with ambitions to pursue higher education or vocational training. That brings our total graduates to 23, 13 of whom are attending university in Jacmel.
- Alumni returned to contribute their time and skills to mentoring younger students.

One of our most significant advancements in 2024 was the introduction, in partnership with World Tutors, of after-school tutoring provided via Starlink satellite internet technology. Students from our remote Haitian communities now have access to tutors from around the world, bringing tailored instruction in French, English, and Math directly to them. This initiative demonstrates HEI's ability to magnify our donors' transformational impact by overcoming barriers and creating pathways to learning, even in the most challenging circumstances.

Looking Ahead

The heart of HEI's work lies in the resilience of the Haitian people—the students who show up with determination to learn, the parents who trust us, the teachers who persevere against all odds, and the communities that stand together in the face of adversity.

In 2025, HEI is committed to expanding the World Tutors initiative, integrating more solar power, computer resources, Starlink capacity and classroom space to deepen the tutoring and after school programs. This could profoundly improve the prospect of our students emerging from the current disorder better equipped to attain economic stability and contribute to Haiti's recovery. We will continue to strengthen partnerships with organizations like World Tutors, FJBJ and FIEH to create a sustainable, scalable model that bridges the gap between crisis and opportunity.

Meanwhile, we've continued to build our all-volunteer team here in the United States. We are delighted to welcome Caroline Racine to our Board with special responsibility for communications. A Haitian-American, Caroline resides in the Washington DC area and brings a distinguished background in corporate communications. Caroline is ably assisted by Orion Douglas, a very talented undergraduate at the University of Chicago with extensive skills in social media. As we push ahead to expand our donor base we will be seeking in 2025 to add a Board member to direct our fundraising initiatives.

As noted, your Board is all-volunteer which means that we minimize administrative expenses and maximize the donor dollars that go to Haiti. 92% of each dollar goes to fund scholarships, afterschool programs and salaries for our on-site partners in Haiti. That strong administrative performance is a key factor again earning our 'Platinum' rating from GuideStar for our stewardship of your financial support.

Gratitude and Hope

None of this would be possible without the unwavering support of our donors, volunteers, and partners. Your belief in the power of education to transform young lives fuels our work every day. Together, we are proving that even in the face of adversity, education can be a light of hope and a tool for lasting change.

Our Partners and Programs

HEI partners with two Haitian-led organizations, Fondation Jean Bellande Joseph (FJBJ) and Foyer d'Initiatives pour l'Education en Haiti (FIEH), formerly Jacmel Scholarship Program. As teachers, school administrators, and dedicated caregivers, our partners are excellent role models for the 148 children currently enrolled in our programs (Fall 2024).

Fondation Jean Bellande Joseph (FJBJ), Cayes-Jacmel

The Joseph family foundation operates in the semi-rural region of Cayes-Jacmel, located about 15 minutes east of Jacmel. Led by Paul Brunet Joseph (Director), a history and geography teacher at the Cayes-Jacmel High School, seven members of the Joseph family and their associates have provided leadership and important services to their community since 2007. FJBJ's 52 children and 21 graduates primarily come from subsistence farming families in the mountain and coastal regions of Jacmel. This region suffers from food insecurity because of gang control of roads between Jacmel and Port-au-Prince, crippling transportation and severely inflating food costs. Materials for craft and dressmaking classes have become scarce, nonetheless FJBJ was able to provide these services:



- Scholarships for 52 children to 26 area schools: These funds cover tuition, uniforms, backpacks, shoes, books, and school supplies. FJBJ pays the fees, completes the paperwork, and oversees attendance and academic outcomes. As students graduated or moved, enrollment decreased from 61 in 2023–2024 to 52 in 2024–2025.
- Weekly meals for 52 children: We supply the only cooked meal many children eat all week. Good nutrition helps children resist disease and perform better in school. At home, these children eat only a cornmeal mush augmented occasionally with a vegetable or fruit. FJBJ provides a weekly meal of rice and beans, fried chicken or beef stew, and a vegetable or plantains with fruit juice.

- Weekly computer literacy classes for 30 children aged 9-19 : Computers donated by Project Redwood allow students to learn Microsoft Word, Excel, and to use the Internet.
- Cooking and baking classes for children 9 19 (when possible):



Students learn to cook basic meals and to bake the cookies, cakes and other sweet treats they sell at school and in the market. They also use their skills at home to improve their families' nutrition. Soap-making is another lucrative project.

Enhanced job training opportunities for secondary school students (when possible):

Ten students attended vocational classes in plumbing, tiling, advanced tailoring and dressmaking, and baking.



- **Summer camp:** Provided a safe space for meals, play, and to learn macrame, floral crafts, languages, reading, and theater arts.
- Christmas and end of year parties for FJBJ's nursery school, Les Hirondelles (Swallows): Children relish celebrations with song, dance, poetry, certificates, and small gifts as they participate in vital early childhood education.

Foyer d'Initiatives pour l'Education en Haiti (FIEH)

Administrator Peterson Jean-Pierre, Assistant Director Toussaint Pierre, and Coordinator Eddysson Pierre lead partner Foyer d'Initiatives pour l'Education en Haiti (FIEH). Peterson is a graduate of University of Haiti and is Director of Jakmel Ekspresyon, an arts and vocational school in downtown Jacmel. He also cofounded two community programs: the Pasquette High School and an agricultural co-operative. Despite decreasing resources, he oversaw these successful programs:



 130 Scholarships to 49 local schools in 2024: As with FJBJ, these scholarship funds equip the children tuition fees, uniforms, books, and school supplies needed to enroll in school. Our policy of consolidating and deepening the scholarship program to encourage better promotion and retention results means FIEH has enrolled 96 students in Fall 2024.






Remedial classes in math, social sciences, and French reading and writing: Students facing national exams for promotion to middle and high school receive tutoring in small groups, as well as students who need extra help to catch up. World Academy Tutors has supplied tutors from around the world to teach students via Starlink.

- **Meals:** Students who participate in remedial classes also receive healthy meals and snacks.
- Summer camp for 83 students: Provided a safe space for meals, play and learning floral arts, cooking, baking, macrame, and making saleable liquid products like soap, detergent, and vinegar as exercises in mathematics, physics, and chemistry.
- End of the school year and Christmas parties: To celebrate our students' courage and hard work in completing their classes despite hunger, lack of transportation, and the danger of violence, we held joyous parties with abundant food, music, poetry, and dance.
